Overview

The academic training in the Japan Studies Program at LaGuardia Community College opens doors to a wide range of exciting career opportunities. With Japan's rich culture, advanced economy, and global influence, students equipped with knowledge of the Japanese language and culture are highly valued in various industries. This guide explores potential career paths, including the JET Program, opportunities in the anime and manga industry, roles in import and export, positions within Japanese corporations in New York City, and more.

1 Japan Exchange and Teaching (JET) Program

- The Japan Exchange and Teaching (JET) Program is a government-sponsored initiative that invites young professionals from around the world to live and work in Japan. Participants serve as Assistant Language Teachers (ALTs), Coordinators for International Relations (CIRs), or Sports Exchange Advisors (SEAs) in local authorities and schools.
- Roles and Responsibilities
 - **Assistant Language Teacher (ALT):** Work alongside Japanese teachers to facilitate English language education in elementary, junior high, and high schools.
 - Coordinator for International Relations (CIR): Engage in international exchange activities at the local government level, requiring a higher proficiency in Japanese.
 - Sports Exchange Advisor (SEA): Promote international exchange through sports.
- · Application Tips
 - **Bachelor's degree:** A Bachelor's degree is required to apply for the JET. Therefore, those who are interested in the JET must have a solid transfer plan to a 4-year institution.
 - Japanese Language Proficiency: While not mandatory for ALTs, basic knowledge of Japanese is beneficial.
 CIR positions require advanced proficiency.
 - Cultural Interest: Demonstrate genuine interest in Japanese culture and international exchange.
 - Flexibility and Adaptability: Show readiness to adapt to new environments and challenges.

Translation and Localization Specialist:

Content Creator and Artist:

Marketing and Distribution:

- Promote anime and manga content through various channels.
- Organize events, conventions, and fan engagement activities.

- Edit manga manuscripts and coordinate with authors and artists.
- Manage publication timelines and quality control.

Import/Export Coordinator:

Manage logistics, documentation, and compliance for international shipments.

Trade Analyst:

Analyze market trends, trade policies, and economic data to inform business decisions.

Business Development Manager:

- Identify opportunities for market expansion and build partnerships with Japanese companies.

Customs Brokerage Specialist:

Navigate customs regulations to ensure smooth import/export processes.

- Skills Required
 - Language Proficiency: Strong command of both English and Japanese.
 - Cultural Competence: Understanding of business etiquette and practices in Japan.
 - **Technical Knowledge:** Familiarity with international trade laws, tariffs, and logistics.

These companies often seek bilingual professionals familiar with Japanese culture to bridge communication and operational gaps. There are many Japanese retails such as Uniqlo and Muji as well.
