



ABOUT JAPANESE OPTION

LIBERAL ARTS JAPANESE OPTION (AA degree) offers an opportunity to learn the Japanese language and other related subjects such as Japanese Literature, Asian Art, East Asian History, Religions and Social Psychology in Asia and to acquire an Associate's degree in Japanese. The curriculum is designed to prepare students for transfer to Baccalaureate (4-year) programs in East Asian Studies and/or Japan Studies. Upon graduation, the Japanese Option at LaGuardia Community College can transfer to the East Asian Studies Major (Japanese Track) at Queens College or the Japanese Language and Culture at Hunter College to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Japanese. Some of our graduates apply for transfer to prestigious colleges and universities in East Asian Studies including Columbia University, NYU, and Temple University Japan Campus.

The goal of the Japanese Option is to develop students' interests and prior knowledge in Japan for professional careers. We will deal with Japanese language/culture as a serious academic subject and study materials beyond your existing interest in Japanese pop culture and anime. WHY YOU SHOULD CHOOSE JAPANESE OPTION

One of the major requirements of the Japanese Option is two years of the Japanese language (from ELJ101 though ELJ104) and obtain a minimum of B grade in each class. In other words, you will be studying the Japanese language throughout your academic progress at LaGuardia. Language learning, especially the one involves a typologically distant language from your native language, requires assiduous effort, rigid self-discipline, and serious time commitment. You should keep it in mind when you change your major to the Japanese Option.

Once you have completed your requirements at LaGuardia, you will be able to feel confident in communicating in Japanese in most of social settings and will have a much deeper understanding about Japanese culture, the history of Japan, Japanese society, Japanese business ethics and business styles, religions in Japan, ethnography of the Japanese people, and Japanese art.

HOW TO CHANGE YOUR MAJOR CONTACT

Students can change their majors at the Registrar's Office (C-107) within the first three or four weeks of the semester. It is highly recommended to meet with the program director (see below) before submitting your Change of Major Form.

- (1) CUNY Pathways Flexible Core consists of six three-credit courses. At least one course from each of the five areas and no more than two courses in any discipline.
- (2) Students without any previous instruction in Japanese should take Elementary Japanese 1 (ELJ101) and Elementary Japanese 2 (ELJ102) as part of Flexible Core for the LA Japanese Option.
- (3) One Flexible Core course must be Urban Study (such as ELN101)
- (4) One Chinese or Korean language course depending on the placement score. Students taking ELC 101 and ELK 101 as electives in the Japanese option will receive credit for those courses without taking ELC102 or ELK102.
- (5) Students who wish to transfer to Queens College are advised to take HUA191 The Art of Eastern Asia, which will count toward the EAS major at QC (=Art History 114: Survey of Asian Art)
- (6) Students who wish to transfer to Queens College are advised to take SSH110 East Asia Civilization and Society, which will count toward the EAS major at QC (=History 112: Introduction to East Asian History)
