Course Description: This online course is designed to further develop students' language ability inFrench. The course continues to introduce students to the four language skills (i.e. speaking, writing, reading, and listening), fundamental grammar, as well as cultural facts of the Francophoneworld. An understanding of Francophone cultures is nourished through the examination of cultural practices and perspectives. The methodology used is communicative and literacy-based, meaning that in every lesson you will be learning language in order to perform a variety of interpersonal, presentational, and interpretive tasks.

Course Objectives: As speakers and writers, students are expected to present, in oral and writtenform, their views and opinions on experiences, ideas, and readings. By the end of the semester, students will be able to:

- · Carry on a more complex conversation in French on such topics as food, family, travel...
- Communicate with others from the target culture in familiar everyday situations, using memorized language and showing basic cultural awareness.
- Present information on both very familiar and everyday topics using practiced or memorizedwords, phrases, and simple sentences through spoken or written language
- Communicate in spontaneous spoken or written conversations on both very familiar and everyday topics, using practiced or memorized words, phrases, simple sentences, andquestions.
- Identify the general topic and some basic information in both very familiar and everyday contexts by recognizing practiced or memorized words, phrases, and simple sentences intexts that are spoken or written.

How to Do Well in this Class

1. Be an active learner. Active learners often have questions that reflect their engagement of thematerial.

2. Put yourself out there. Language learning requires you to make mistakes, both in your assignments and in the discussion forums.

3. Personalize vocabulary. You will remember vocabulary when you "own" it. Make words relevant oyour life by thinking of what you can say about yourself with them. Write extra sentences that aremeaningful to you so that the vocabulary becomes "yours" and expresses something about your world. Use the new vocabulary in your videos.

4. Develop your memorization skills. Experiment with different techniques, combining listening, speaking and writing together as much as possible.

5. Read out loud, and repeat new words many times. The only way to train your brain and yourmouth to speak this language is by doing it aloud.

6. Correct yourself. Good language learners learn from their own successes and mistakes and those of others. Correcting mistakes is an essential part of the learning process.
